

Unemployment Rate and FTEs



Historically, as the unemployment rate in Skagit County dips, so does SVC enrollment. Efforts in 2014-15 and 2015-16 resulted in increased enrollment despite declining unemployment.

Objective 1:

The College will meet or exceed Strategic Enrollment Management Targets (SEM).


Indicators:


- 1. Actual State FTEs compared to State FTEs Allocation.
- 2. International FTEs compared to actual.

Threshold:

Meet or exceed State FTE Allocation and International SEM targets.

Objective 2:


The College will meet or exceed the statewide participation rate.

Indicator:

SVC District participation rate compared to the CTC System participation rate.

Threshold:

Meet or exceed participation rate for the CTC System.



Participation Rate: The number of persons age 18-44 years enrolled as a percent of the relevant population.

SVC has a 1 point higher participation rate than the CTC system.

Core Theme - Access

Objective 3:

The College enrollment will reflect District demographics.

Indicators:

- 1. Enrollment distribution by race/ethnicity compared to district population
- 2. Enrollment in degree program by race/ethnicity compared to district population


3. Enrollment in BEdA program compared to adults with less than a high school diploma in the district.

4. Enrollment in ESL program compared to foreign-born residents who don't have English proficiency in the district.

Threshold:

Parity between population and enrollment for student subpopulations.

Latino Students Compared to District Population



SVC enrolled 12 percentage points more Latino students than the community's percentage of Latino residents.


These adults are ages 18 to 64, excluding Running Start students.

SVC continues to increase enrollment of Latino students with another increase of 2 percentage points more than the previous year.




3-Year Trend of Degree-Seeking Latino Enrollments

SVC enrolled 1 percentage point more of degree-seeking Latino students over the last year.








3-Year Trend of BEdA Enrollments



SVC enrolled 2 percentage points more ESL students than the community's percentage of foreign born adults with limited English proficiency.
